



# Internet Governance Forum 2023 | Regional Parliamentary Track alongside the AfIGF The Contribution of Parliamentarians to Shape Digital Trust on the African Continent

Concept note

#### **CONTEXT**

The <u>Internet Governance Forum</u> (IGF), convened annually by the UN Secretary-General, is a global multistakeholder platform that facilitates discussions on Internet and digital policy issues. This year, the Government of Japan will host the United Nations 18th Internet Governance Forum (IGF 2023) under the overarching theme "The Internet We Want – Empowering All People".

The <u>African IGF</u> (AfIGF) is a regional IGF initiative dedicated to fostering exchanges within the region on relevant digital policy topics. In recent years, the IGF has sought to strengthen the participation of parliamentarians in discussions on some of the most pressing issues related to the use, evolution and governance of the Internet and related digital technologies.

Building on last year's Parliamentary Track experience at the African IGF in Malawi, a <u>symposium dedicated to parliamentarians from across the African region</u> is to be held again this year in Abuja, Nigeria, in the context of the 2023 AfIGF meeting. The overarching theme of the track is "The Contribution of Parliamentarians to Shape Digital Trust on the African Continent".

#### **DESCRIPTION**

The regional Parliamentary Track is dedicated to members of national parliaments from African countries and members from other regions who would like to attend or contribute. The activities will facilitate dialogue and exchanges on key digital policy issues among Members of Parliaments (MPs), and between MPs and other stakeholders from within and beyond the African continent. Focus will be given to the Parliamentarians in the information and communication technology (ICT) related committees at the national or regional parliaments, who work on digital affairs and Internet policy issues.

## **Objectives**

- Familiarize MPs with the IGF space and the broader international ecosystem for Internet governance and digital policy. Encourage them to actively contribute to relevant regional and international processes.
- Prepare MPs for participation in the IGF 2023 meeting and the dedicated Parliamentary Track, as well as future IGF meetings and activities.
- Update MPs on a set of Internet governance and digital policy issues relevant to African countries.
   Facilitate dialogue on these issues with other parliamentarians, as well as with relevant international and regional organisations from different stakeholder groups (intergovernmental organisations, the technical community, private sector, civil society).





- Discuss the relevance of legislative work in shaping a trustworthy digital future in the region.
   Highlight issues that need to be considered when legislation for the digital space is developed (e.g., avoiding unintended consequences for the open and global nature of the Internet).
- Facilitate cooperation and exchanges of good practices with MPs from national and regional parliaments, as well as parliaments from other regions, which have advanced legislative work on digital policy issues.
- Expose the MPs to relevant internet governance processes (e.g., the Global Digital Compact, WSIS+20 review) and UN flagship initiatives (e.g., the Roadmap for Digital Cooperation, Our Common Agenda).

# Co-organizers

 The symposium is co-organised by the UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs (DESA), the IGF Secretariat, the AfIGF Secretariat, the African Union, the GIZ and the African School on Internet Governance (AfriSIG).

### **OUTPUT**

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Parliamentarians from the region are invited to discuss the proposed issues with experts, share their views, explore the questions at hand, and exchange opinions and experience on existing or potential legislative solutions.

The key messages that emerge from the regional Parliamentary Track exchanges will be captured as the formal, action oriented regional IGF 2023 Parliamentary Track output. The regional perspectives shared at the symposium will also be included in the activities of the annual IGF Parliamentary Track, to be held in October 2023 in Kyoto, Japan.

#### **FORMAT AND PROGRAMME**

The Parliamentary Track at the regional IGF will include:

- Activities in collaboration with the African School on Internet Governance on 18 September 2023.
- A dedicated session between Members of Parliaments and the African Youth.
- Special sessions dedicated to Members of Parliaments on 19 September.
- A parliamentary roundtable during the AfIGF meeting, on 20 September.
- The participation of MPs in other sessions of the AfIGF.
